## HCAOG BY THE NUMBERS

Every year HCAOG has fiduciary responsibilities for allocating State and Federal funds from various sources to our local jurisdictions and transit agencies.

#### RSTP

REGIONAL SURFACE
TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM

\$1.6M

Funds primarily used to augment city, county, and tribal road budgets.
Regionally distributed based on an HCAOG adopted formula.

#### LTF

LOCAL TRANSPORTATION FUND

\$5.1M

Funds transit operations. In jurisdictions with no unmet transit needs their portion can go to local streets and roads. Also funds a portion of HCAOG's operating budget.

#### SGR STATE OF GOOD REPAIR

\$240K

Humboldt Transit Authority and Arcata & Mad River Transit received these funds to keep fleets and bus stop shelters in good repair.

#### STATE TRANSIT ASSISTANCE

\$1.8M

Humboldt Transit Authority and Arcata & Mad River Transit received these funds for operating, Dial a Ride, fuel & maintenance, and route planning.

#### SB 125 FORMULA-BASED TIRCP/ZETCP

\$7.1M

Regional allocation of Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program & Zero Emission Transit Capital program to maintain existing service and operations of transit services

FEDERAL TRANSIT AUTHORITY GRANT PROGRAM

\$1.0M

Regional apportionment through a Federal Transit Administration Grant program. These funds provided operating assistance to Humboldt Transit Authority.

#### 2% BIKE & PED LOCAL TRANSPORTATION FUND

#### \$176K

These funds are set aside specifically for projects that benefit bicyclists and pedestrians. Funding supported bike share programs, roundabout design, Bay to Zoo Trail support, and pedestrian and ADA improvements.

## HCAOG FUNDING IN ACTION

#### \$15.5M ALLOCATED TO TRANSIT

Transit agencies received the majority of funding allocated through HCAOG. This funding supported operating costs, promoting free and reduced bus fare, purchasing of zero-emission buses, planning for zero-emission bus infrastructure, Dial a Ride programs, microtransit, ADA upgrades, facility repairs, and safety improvements.



## \$1.6M ALLOCATED TO STREETS AND ROADS

This funding augments local budgets. A portion is awarded specifically for bicycle and pedestrian improvements.

REAP 1.0

HCAOG suballocated REAP 1.0 grant funds to cities, the county, and the housing authority for technical assistance with housing planning studies and the Regional Climate Action Plan. HCAOG also administered small grants for creating a multi-media catalog of residents' housing-needs stories, to raise awareness and open dialogue for the hardships and barriers that Humboldt residents have and do face due to the shortage of affordable housing or the lack of housing near school, work, services, or other basic needs.

\$37K in small arts grants for Housing Stories

\$45K to smaller, under-resourced city planning and County development departments

\$184K for technical assistance grants for housing planning studies

\$300K for Regional Climate Action Plan revisions to fortify a qualified Climate Action Plan under CEQA.
